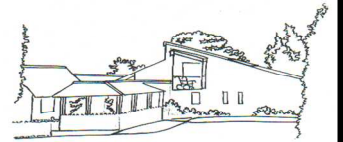

## Seasonal Influenza Clinics

These vaccinations are recommended for all those aged 65 years and over AND people who are considered to be *At Risk*, i.e. those with chronic respiratory and heart disease, diabetes, serious kidney or liver disease, on repeat steroid medication or lowered immunity due to disease or treatment.

Please note that you only need 1 Pneumonia vaccination in your lifetime, but Influenza is given annually.

The vaccines will be **available from 29th September**. Please call to make a 5 minute appointment in one of our flu clinics during our regular working day. **Extended times are being offered** this year to help those who find surgery times difficult.

These are:

- Wednesday 30th September until 7:30pm
- Saturday 3rd October 9am to 1pm

- Thursday 8th and Friday 9th October starting at 8am.

The District Nurses will continue to visit patients who are not able to attend the surgery for an appointment. We are not able to give a vaccine to those patients who do not fall into the *At Risk* groups during the campaign.

Boots the Chemist offer flu vaccinations at some of their larger shops, which can be paid for.

## Medicine Management Savings

The tentacles of the Credit Crunch have finally wormed their way into Laurel Bank Surgery. West Cheshire PCT, are being asked to save a massive sum of money from their slice of the NHS budget. This has been passed on to all practices within the PCT – we are all going to have to do our bit!

At Laurel Bank Surgery, we have always been committed to providing the best care for our patients; we will continue to do so, but have to be mindful of our responsibility to the wider NHS economy. As such, those of you who get your medication from the dispensary may notice some changes to your medications.

The **drugs you receive will be the same** but the **manufacturers will alter** and as a result the 'Brand Name' and packaging may

change from time to time.

All drugs dispensed from the practice have passed stringent checks nationally and are licensed for use in the UK.

When a drug first hits the market, it is produced under a patent by one or two companies. When the patent runs out, the drug can be manufactured by other companies, often for a considerably cheaper price.

If these drugs are used instead of the 'Original Brand' it can lead to considerable savings for the wider health economy.

The Medicine Management Team at the surgery will continue to closely monitor the quality of all medicines dispensed and will bring to the attention of the partners any concerns raised by our patients.

## Swine Flu Update

Swine Flu symptoms are similar to those of seasonal flu (fever, fatigue, lack of appetite, coughing, sore throat, pain in muscles & joints, headache and chills and sometimes vomiting & diarrhoea).

The virus spreads between people in the same way.

General hygiene can help to reduce the spread:

- Cover your nose and mouth when coughing or sneezing.
- Use a tissue whenever possible and dispose of dirty tissues promptly and carefully.
- Maintain good basic hygiene. Clean hard surfaces (i.e. door handles) with normal cleaning products.
- Stay at home if you think you may have the swine flu virus.

If you think you may have swine flu, you can check your symptoms on [www.nhs.uk](http://www.nhs.uk), look at the information on [www.hpa.org.uk](http://www.hpa.org.uk) or call the Swine Flu information line on 0800 1 513 513.

If you are still concerned, **please do NOT attend surgery**. Contact either the practice by phone or the National Pandemic Flu Service on 0800 1513 100 or online at [www.direct.gov.uk/pandemicflu](http://www.direct.gov.uk/pandemicflu).

You should call your doctor directly if 1) you have a serious underlying illness, 2) you are pregnant, 3) you have a sick child or 4) your condition suddenly gets worse.

If your GP thinks you have swine flu, an authorisation voucher for antiviral medication will be given. You will need a flu friend (family or friend) to collect the voucher from the surgery and travel to the

collection point to collect your antivirals.

Antiviral medication DOES NOT CURE the infection but reduces the development of the virus, lessens the symptoms and helps the body recover. It should be taken as soon as possible, ideally within 48 hours of the infection starting.

Antivirals will not be given to the contacts of swine flu, but treatment will be given to those in a high risk group where there is close prolonged contact with the ill person.

The contact will be treated if at particularly high risk of complications from influenza. This decision will be taken by the GP with the assistance of another appropriate expert where necessary.
